

Bylaws committee and as a competition judge. Becky has over 25 years of technical communication experience.



Trina Grieshaber

Trina Grieshaber is an independent technical writing consultant. She served as President of STC Wisconsin in 2009-10 before moving to the Chicago area.



How long have you been working in tech comm?

Since the spring of 2000. A former employer asked me to assist with a contract writing reports for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and I discovered that I really enjoyed the work.

When and how did you first get involved with STC?

I first attended an STC meeting I believe sometime that year in Milwaukee. It was about six years later that I started taking leadership positions for the Wisconsin chapter.

What is your most common role as a technical communicator? Do you play any additional roles?

In the organizations I've worked for, most commonly my role as a technical communicator focused on writing and editing policies and procedures. Other related roles included managing those documentation projects, leading discussions, and presenting to in-house audiences.

What advice would you give someone who is thinking about joining STC?

You'll get the most out of your membership by volunteering, even in a small way like writing one article a year or assisting at an event. If you ever have the chance to attend or, even better, present at an STC Summit, take the opportunity. You'll be glad you went. The best part of STC is the people.

What's your tech comm philosophy?

Pay close attention to discover the needs of all relevant audiences and to find a way to balance meeting those needs.

What's your favorite STC moment?

Two favorite moments:

1. In 2004 I attended my first STC Summit as a student member and had the pleasure to see my advisor, Prof. Gerald Alred, receive the Jay R. Gould award.

2. Because the Wisconsin chapter had coordinated with the Chicago chapter on a few events during my time, I already knew some of the Chicago chapter members when I moved here five years ago. Friendly faces welcomed me into the familiar culture of STC, which helped me greatly in transitioning to life here.

What do you like most (and least!) about the city?

There are so many different options for keeping yourself busy through entertainment and learning new skills. As long as you have leisure time, there aren't many excuses for being bored here. The flip side of so many options is that sometimes it's overwhelming to choose among them.

What's your favorite place to visit?

Lake Michigan. I love sailing on the lake, swimming in it, and just walking on the shore listening to waves. Ω
