

At the October Chapter meeting we raised a toast and bid a fond farewell to *Russ Friend*, who has left the land of the working stiffs to enjoy the green pastures of retirement. Russ is a longtime STC member in Chicago who started his writing career with McDonnell Douglas in 1978, after joining STC the previous year as an Associate Member. After winning 1st Place in the St. Louis Chapter competition, he chaired the competition the following year.

The early 1980s brought Russ up to the Chicago area where he did training and technical writing stints of varying lengths for different organizations, including Honeywell, Teradyne and Motorola. His longest tenure was at Siemens Building Technologies in Buffalo Grove, where he worked for almost 15 years alongside current chapter Vice President Rita Hovorka and Treasurer Pete Wagner.

Russ was active in the Chicago Chapter throughout his career. He was Chapter President in 2000/2001, periodically judged in various annual Technical Communication competitions and did training for the Chapter in the late 1980s/1990s. Russ served as Treasurer for the ITCC [International Technical Communication Conference] in 1989. He received the Frank Award and was named STC Associate Fellow in 2005 and was named STC Fellow in 2010.

Russ ended his writing career as Vice President – Senior Documentation Specialist at Northern Trust Corporation in October, just a few days after the October meeting. Thanks Russ for your many years of service to the technical communications field, and for your friendship. This writer will certainly miss you and hopes to see you at the occasional Thursdays luncheon or chapter meeting.

## STC Chicago October 2019 Chapter Meeting Summary

Members of the Society for Technical Communication (STC) - Chicago gathered on October 17, 2019 to hear STC Chicago member Jessica Behles speak about working in cybersecurity. Behles' talk, titled "Wanna Cyber?: Breaking Into and Succeeding in Cybersecurity as a Technical Communicator," took place at Bar Louie in Printer's Row, with approximately 18 members in attendance.

Ms. Behles, who has worked in cybersecurity since 2013, quickly delved into one of the sector's most pressing issues: the workforce gap. Cybersecurity, a relatively new field, is becoming increasingly complex due to more sophisticated hardware and technical systems. However, this trend has led to advances in malicious programs designed to steal vast amounts of valuable data. From phishing scams to trojan bots, cyber criminals have a large supply of tools to use against unsuspecting victims.

Unfortunately, there are not enough skilled cybersecurity professionals to fill vacancies and stop these attacks. Worldwide, almost three million job openings exist in cybersecurity. Further, the average computer user is not aware of threats posed by cyber criminals, and how to protect themselves. Simply updating a computer's antivirus software and turning on a firewall will not do the trick.

How does a technical writer interested in the field break-in, and become part of the solution? It's easier than you may think. In the first phase of her study, Ms. Behles analyzed 100 technical communication job ads in the cybersecurity industry. Her research involved looking at trends, job descriptions, and barriers to entry. She discovered that while a bachelor's degree is usually required, many openings did not mandate candidates have cybersecurity experience, specialized certifications, or security clearance.

The second phase of her study consisted of in-depth interviews with five technical communicators working in cybersecurity. These professionals had four recommendations for security-minded technical communicators: learn about the field through self-study and attending conferences, write about your learning experiences, try using some of the standard

cybersecurity tools, and maintain your knowledge base over time. Cybersecurity is a rapidly changing industry, but this breakneck pace means continual opportunities for growth and challenge, on top of an exciting career trajectory.
